It has been a good week for Cascadia-supported initiatives.

The Alaskan Way Viaduct. The Washington House approved the deep-bored tunnel alternative for the Viaduct. Congratulations to the SR 99 Coalition for their continued efforts in shepherding this through the Legislature. We expect (and hope) the full approval from the legislature will come by the close of the weekend. Cascadia Center has supported the deep-bored tunnel alternative option since 2005, sponsoring numerous papers and international tunneling forums, including an <u>Underground Contractors Association tunneling session on May 4, 2009</u>, where worldwide experts will be in Seattle meeting with the public and the Washington Department of Transportation. High-Speed Rail. President Obama has announced a \$13 billion high-speed rail program, which includes the Vancouver, B.C. to Eugene corridor. The Cascadia Center was launched in 1994 on the idea of high-speed rail in this corridor. Beginning on May 27, 2009, with a train tour to Portland, we will launch a "Beyond Oil" campaign effort to continue through the 2010 Olympic Games in Vancouver to support an expanded Amtrak *Cascades* program to improve passenger rail service in our region.
