Dear Members of the House Rules Committee,

# I support the Bored Tunnel Hybrid solution to replace the Alaskan Way Viaduct and I urge you to move ESSB 5768 to a vote on the House floor.

This solution will serve everyone in Washington state. The Alaskan Way Viaduct corridor is a vital transportation and economic link to communities south, north and east of Seattle, to workers and companies of all sizes including Boeing and Microsoft and their suppliers, and to towns and cities across the state—especially those who depend on the Port of Seattle to get their goods to and from market.
